1ST YEAR

EXPLORATION

CONNECTIONS

Profile the credentials and specializations of faculty members or industry professionals.

Explore <u>engineering clubs</u> and attend general meetings for clubs that interest you.

Evaluate your interests, values, and skills by taking the MyPlan assessment and meet with a <u>Career Counselor</u> to discuss your specific results.

Research <u>study abroad</u> opportunities.

Sign up for <u>Engineering Small Groups</u> for academic support in core curriculum courses.

Participate in <u>Saturdays of Service</u> to serve your community and network with UB students and staff.

Attend the spring <u>Senior Design Expo</u> to engage with students presenting their capstone design projects.

2ND YEAR

Review research articles on topics of interest to become more familiar with contributors to the field and more versed in digesting academic writing.

Observe an MS thesis or PhD dissertation defense presentation.

Attend the <u>Celebration of Academic Excellence</u> to explore research and creative works by UB peers.

Explore <u>entrepreneurship</u> resources like <u>Blackstone</u> <u>LaunchPad</u>.

Participate in a Life and Learning networking workshop.

Register for <u>REALM</u>, a professional networking and shadowing opportunity in the Buffalo or NYC regions.

Research professional technical societies related to your discipline and carry out <u>informational interviews</u> with members of the organizations to learn more.

3RD YEAR

Explore <u>graduate schools</u> and faculty research initiatives to prepare for campus visits and prepare for <u>GRE</u>, <u>LSAT</u>, or <u>MCAT</u> exams if necessary.

Attend research seminars to keep abreast of current research in your discipline.

Attend the spring <u>Graduate Research Poster</u> Competition.

Research requirements for careers of interest and identify opportunities to fill skills gaps.

Develop a relationship with a faculty advisor.

Identify and meet a career mentor through the UB <u>Career Connector Network</u>.

Join a technical society related to your discipline.

4TH OR FINAL YEAR

Explore considerations such as the cost of living, job market, and average salary in geographic areas of interest as you apply for jobs or graduate schools.

Attend technical society meetings to network with professionals in your field.

Join groups on LinkedIn reflecting specific careers or topics of interest within your discipline.

After graduation, stay in touch with UB through <u>UB Connect</u> and the <u>Engineering Alumni LinkedIn group</u>.

Pursue a self-led hands-on <u>tinkering project</u> to enhance technical skills and prepare for future team projects.

Participate in <u>Engineers Week</u> and check out activities like Bot Wars and Quadcopter Racing.

<u>Study abroad</u> in <u>Troyes, France</u> during the summer semester.

Join an engineering club during the spring semester.

Participate in <u>engineering intramurals</u>, short-term extracurricular projects completed in small groups.

Engage in a leadership or communication workshop as part of the <u>Life and Learning</u> series.

Apply for research experiences through <u>REU</u> and <u>CURCA</u>.

Run for an <u>engineering club</u> executive board position for junior year.

Find an internship or co-op by participating in the <u>STEM</u> <u>UP</u> job and internship fair in the fall.

Complete an **Engineering Intramurals** project.

Participate in a <u>CURCA</u> research project at UB or spend the summer participating in <u>Research Experiences for</u> <u>Undergraduates (REU)</u>.

Run for the President or Director of an <u>engineering club</u> for your senior year.

Find and pursue an <u>internship</u> or <u>co-op</u> through <u>STEM</u> <u>UP</u>, <u>Bullseye</u>, <u>Indeed</u> etc.

Learn about the guidelines for international students seeking <u>Curricular Practical Training</u> during senior year.

Continue internships or find a student assistant/grader position.

Continue to contribute to student clubs and other organizations, taking on an increasing level of responsibility.

Make an <u>appointment</u> at <u>Career Services</u> to have your resume, cover letter, and LinkedIn profile reviewed prior to applying for an internship.

Polish your <u>interviewing skills</u> by doing a practice interview session with Career Services.

Update your <u>resume</u> as you master new skills, projects, and experiences.
